Welcome to The City College of Acupuncture!

Studying Chinese Medicine is a life-changing and life-long experience. It is exciting and challenging, but also enormously empowering. All of us come to Chinese Medicine and Acupuncture via our own unique route, and inspired by a variety of experienced teachers, develop into unique practitioners. We know that we can help you on your own journey to becoming a successful and unique practitioner.

By attending our Open Evening Event, you have already made the first step on this journey. If you are still wondering whether studying acupuncture at The City College of Acupuncture is for you, we are here to answer your questions.

We run a professional Licentiate Diploma in Acupuncture course (*Lic.Ac*), which is a degree-level, in-depth, three-year full-time course (two full days per week in college, plus 10-15 hours of preparation home study per week) - as dictated by the British Acupuncture Accreditation Board (BAAB), with whom we have full accreditation.

BAAB courses are the gold standard of the profession, ensuring a solid basis of professional knowledge, attitudes, values and skills. We will give you practical, hands-on degree-level education without the academic constraints of a degree.

We also teach a Diploma in Tui Na course (*Dip. Tui Na*). Our one-year course is open to fully qualified Acupuncturists and fully qualified TCM practitioners. For non-qualified applicants, our *Tui Na* course can be studied over a two-year period by taking Year 1 of our Acupuncture Programme, and then taking *Tui Na* in conjunction with Year 2 of our Acupuncture Programme.

People often worry that they are not academic enough to study on a degree-level course, or that age is a barrier. Don't let this put you off! Students come to acupuncture from all walks of life, some with no formal qualifications, some with PhDs, and everything in between, and our course is designed to give you all the support you need whatever your background.

You will find our College is a very friendly environment, and you will be able to receive all the guidance you require. Your life experiences, how you build upon them, and your ability to connect with people will be as crucial as your academic understanding.

Why study with us?

TEN great reasons to study Acupuncture and *Tui Na* at The City College of Acupuncture:

1) A broad and thorough grounding in Traditional Chinese Medicine

- We believe that students shouldn't specialise too early in their training, so we teach you all of the main ways of diagnosing and using acupuncture
- Specialising in one form of acupuncture too early means that in order to further your understanding of TCM you may actually need to go back to basics to fully understand what you didn't initially cover

2) Hands-on, practical work in every module

- Our aim is to create excellent practitioners, which means we have a strong focus on the practical skills of acupuncture from the outset
- Our students start needling, cupping and using moxibustion within a few weeks of starting the course, and they continue doing this throughout the whole of the course

3) Small groups within each anatomy & point location class means apprentice-like training

- Learning anatomy and point location is difficult if you don't have any experience in bodywork, so we split our students into small groups within each class for these particular classes as it is essential to get extensive one-to-one feedback
- In our experience, subjects like Western Medical Sciences can also be as complex to understand as Chinese Medicine - which is why we provide support to all our students in these subjects

4) An eclectic approach to teaching

- Our teaching staff trained in a number of different institutions, and they therefore bring a wide range of experience to the CCA course
- We work hard to make sure that what we teach you is up-to-date and relevant to the work of an acupuncturist

5) High academic standards

- Our acupuncture course is taught at levels 4, 5, and 6, which means that it is at **the same level as a degree** but without the additional cost and restrictions that a degree would bring

- BAAB-accredited courses are taught at honours degree-level

Anand Marshall BSc, LicAc, Dip Kanpo, MBAcC, MRCHM

- Anand Marshall worked in the first NHS Complementary Therapies Unit in Westminster
- He specialises in Japanese forms of acupuncture and herbalism
- Anand qualified as a Traditional Acupuncturist from the London School of Traditional Acupuncture and Chinese Medicine and as a Kanpo Herbalist (Japanese herbalist) from the Japanese Herbal Medicine apprenticeship course. He undertook post-graduate training in Japanese Acupuncture with Dr Stephen Birch. He attended postgraduate training with Dr Arnould Versluys focussing on the Shan Han Lun Herbal medicine.
- *'Before I qualified as a practitioner I worked as a senior social worker in Children's Families teams and later in a Youth Offending team. As much as I valued this job, I realised it was not a career that I could envisage undertaking for the rest of my life.'*
- *Due to the stressful nature of my job, I developed pains and sleep problems and out of desperation sought the help of an acupuncturist. Within a few sessions my energy increased, my pain reduced, and I was sleeping well. After a few more years of occasional treatments, I decided to embark on my new career and have never looked back.*
- *I worked from 2001 to 2014 in Westminster as part of an NHS complementary medicine service – the first of its kind in Britain – where I treated GP-referred patients suffering from insomnia, menstrual problems, peripheral joint pains and muscular skeletal conditions'.*

Alex Brazkiewicz BSc (Hons), Dip Tui Na, Cert Qigong, Cert.Ed., Cert Paramedic Science, MGOC

- Alex is an accomplished Traditional Chinese Medicine practitioner, Tui Na tutor, State Registered Paramedic and an Osteopath
- Alex was introduced to Shiatsu through his martial arts training over 30 years ago and has been practising bodywork and Japanese martial arts ever since. He gained his degree in Traditional Acupuncture at the College of Integrated Chinese Medicine in Reading after which he volunteered at the NHS Gateway clinic in South London.
- Alex's passion for Tui Na resulted in his studying extensively in China, including undertaking regular month-long study trips to Beijing to study Channel Palpation and Applied Channel Theory under Professor Wang Ju Yi. After his last trip in 2013 he returned to complete a 5-year degree in Osteopathy. Alex practices in Malvern where he integrates Chinese and Western Orthopaedic Medicine in the treatment of musculoskeletal conditions.

- Alex is also an HCPC registered Paramedic and served 17 years with the London Ambulance Service. He and his wife, Judi, own an approved First Aid training organisation which also delivers specialist first aid training to Chinese Medicine practitioners.
- His Holos Healthcare Company has received the nation-wide contract from the British Acupuncture Council (BACc) to undertake the First Aid and Red Flag Warning Features CPD courses

Alex Jacobs, MA, MSc, Bsc, LicAc, MBAcC, MRCHM

- Alex is fluent in Mandarin and has studied TCM extensively in Taiwan
- He is a current president of The Register of Chinese Herbal Medicine
- Alex became interested in Chinese medicine while studying Mandarin in Taiwan, and on his return to the UK he trained in Acupuncture, Tui Na and Chinese Herbal Medicine. In 2011 he founded the London Chinese Medicine Meetup Group to teach Yangsheng self-help techniques to the public. He organised the conference for the Register of Chinese Herbal Medicine for 8 years and in 2020 was elected president.
- Alex is fluent in Mandarin Chinese, written and spoken, and regularly makes trips to Taiwan to continue his studies and deepen his practice.

CCA: It's all about the clinical experience!

When you qualify, we want you to feel completely confident in treating a wide range of conditions - physical, emotional (and sometimes even spiritual). To do this you need to have observed and practiced a wide range of treatment techniques.

The CCA Acupuncture course is composed of modules that focus on different specialist areas. In addition, we also have some strands of activity which cut across all the modules - practical strands - which mean that all of your lessons have a practical aspect to them.

Practical Techniques Strand

We want you to be relaxed and confident about treating when you go into our teaching clinic. Clinical skills such as tongue and pulse diagnosis, needling, cupping, *gua sha*, moxibustion, electro acupuncture and auricular acupuncture start being taught within a few weeks of you joining us and are practiced regularly throughout the course.

Every lesson you take will have time dedicated to the Practical Skills Strand in order to give you as much experience in treating as possible.

In order to gain experience in practical skills you will need to take turns with your classmates, removing/loosening articles of clothing (behind towels) in some classes so that other students can locate anatomical landmarks and practice finding acupuncture points on each other. You will also start practicing needling, cupping, moxibustion and the other ancillary skills on your classmates and they, in turn, will practice on you - all in a highly supervised setting, of course.

Apprenticeship Days Strand

Another strand that cuts across several modules is the Apprenticeship Day strand. On these days you get to observe in close proximity volunteer members of the public as patients being treated for a wide range of conditions. You are able to practice your tongue and pulse skills and discuss the cases in depth with the practitioners.

The treatments are given initially by CCA tutors, but in the second year a wide range of other practitioners are brought in - some newly qualified, some hugely experienced - so that you can see the scope and breadth of treatment possibilities. We pride ourselves on being a college that embraces eclecticism and we make sure that you see a wide range of practitioners from different backgrounds so that you can start to think about how you would like to practice once qualified.

Our Support Still Continues When You Have Graduated

If you have missed any lectures or need to refresh your knowledge on any subject, you are welcome to come to college and re-attend any lecture on the course. Just let us know what you need to go over and we will tell you when those classes are running.

Acupuncture - Is It for Me?

Attendance and Time Commitments

Our acupuncture course runs from 9.30 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. on two days onsite in college with an additional 10-15 hours of preparation home study each week.

Therefore, our course is regarded as 'full-time'.

- **Study Acupuncture with us on Mondays and Tuesday starting in September 2024***

*N.B. Subject to demand, we will also operate a September 2024 Thursday and Friday Intake

- **Study our 2-year Tui Na course with us on Monday and Tuesday starting in September 2024***

*N.B. Subject to demand, we will also operate a September 2024 Thursday and Friday Intake

- **Study our 1-year Tui Na course with us on Saturdays in October 2024**

You will keep the same set of class days for the duration of your course. This will enable you to organise your life in advance if you are going to be working part-time, or if you need to arrange child-care.

The City College of Acupuncture course is structured to run over three years. Each year has 60 days of classroom tuition. These days roughly coincide with school terms, so you will get breaks at the traditional times such as Christmas, Easter and the Summer.

You will have the chance to take study breaks, if you need to. Students must complete all of the modules within five years. (Please note that returning students will pay the prevailing course fees)

You will be expected to attend at least 80% of your non-practical lectures.

100% attendance is required for your 400 Clinical Hours.

Studying with us will be a big commitment, but it will be worth it!

Please note that in the final year we run two shifts on the clinical days. This means that one group comes in earlier and leaves earlier, whilst another comes in later and leaves later. We will do our best to accommodate you in the clinic of your choice, subject to availability.

Additional time commitments

There are, of course, additional time commitments.

As this is a degree-level course you will be expected to do a considerable amount of preparation home study - in the region of 10-15 hours every week.

This could consist of recommended reading, memorising facts, writing essays, practising your anatomy or point location with friends, or even reflecting on your experiences.

Each lesson will have tutor-directed home study to go with it, but there will also be time for you to just 'follow your nose' and complete additional study that interests you.

APPLICANT INFORMATION SHEET

The City College of Acupuncture course has been designed to create fantastic practitioners.

Don't be put off by thinking that you require any previous specialist training - we will teach you everything you need to know to become a professional Acupuncturist.

Our entry requirements are:

- **Appropriate life experience or 120 points at 'A' level**
- **No previous practitioner experience or science qualifications are required***
- **English Test**

You may wish to study Acupuncture or Tui Na massage as a career change and may not have previous academic qualifications. This need not be viewed as a barrier to becoming a successful practitioner! Our in-depth interview techniques will be able to establish if you are suitable to enrol on our course.

At interview we will be looking for your commitment to the subject, your ability to study in Higher Education, your life experiences and how you have built upon them, and your ability to interact with people. The areas that we will discuss with you during interview include:

Study - Studying any form of Chinese Medicine takes commitment

- Are you able to set aside 10-15 hrs per week for preparation home study?

- Do you have access to a computer, the Internet and IT skills appropriate for this level of study?
- Will you be able to attend 80% of normal lectures plus 100% of the designated clinical hours? There are no exemptions from the Clinical Hours.

Practical work - Acupuncture is a practical skill and students acquiring these skills will need to participate in being models/patients and working with other students

- Will you be able to remove/loosen clothing (behind screens if required) down to your underwear in some classes, so that your classmates can locate acupoints and anatomy on you, and vice versa?
- Will you be able to practice skills on your classmates such as needling and cupping?
- **Will you be able to work on both males and females?**

Practitioner development - You will be studying to become a therapist and to work with people in a respectful and appropriate manner

- Are you fluent in English?
- Is there anything that might prevent you from joining a professional register after completing your studies, such as a criminal record, alcohol and drug dependency issues or mental health issues?
- Are you aware that studying to be a practitioner will involve self-reflection?
- You may be asked to examine who you are and what motivates you, and at times this may take you out of your normal comfort zone.

Please note that we are a selective college. We are sometimes unable to offer a place if we think someone is not a good fit for our course.

RPL - *If you have studied some aspects of Chinese Medicine or Western Medicine previously, you may be able to get Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) - enabling exemption from certain aspects of the programme. Please speak to the Head Acupuncture Administrator for further information.

Student Support

Studying acupuncture isn't an easy option. It is hard – but it is also incredibly exciting and rewarding. You may find some elements of the course challenging, so we will make sure that you have all the support you need, both academic and pastoral.

Your Support Inside CCA

Academic Tutorials

You will receive academic tutorials for each subject you study where you will be able to clarify and deepen your understanding of Acupuncture and Chinese Medicine. Our teachers are all very approachable, and will be happy to assist you and signpost you for support where necessary.

Student Welfare and Support

If you have any sudden personal events, or sudden health events, or if you have any disabilities or long-term issues which might interfere with your studies, our students can contact our Student Welfare Officer, Head Acupuncture Administrator, or our Programme Leader. They will be able to discuss available support with you, and offer one-to-one advice about any problems you are experiencing. Any information can be given confidentially, and will not be shared with your Tutors without your agreement.

We will always be happy to welcome you back after you have qualified, if you would like to re-attend a particular lesson because you missed it for some reason, or would just like to brush up on your TCM knowledge, we are happy for you to sit in as long as there is room in the class.

Acupuncture Course Fees - September-24 Intake

Our Acupuncture **September-24 Intake** will be for **Monday & Tuesday class days**, and once that Intake is full, we will also operate a Thursday & Friday class days Intake, subject to demand.

Our Intakes are subject to a minimum number of 18 Students per class. The maximum number will be 24 Students per class.

Students keep the same set of class days for all three years of the course.

Registration Fee: £150

Full-time: Two days each week in college, plus approximately 10-15 hours of preparation home study per week.

• Instalments:

It is possible to pay your fees in 2 equal instalments. **There is an administration fee of £100 for this option.**

Course fees (full payment, or the first of the 2-part instalments) are due following a successful interview, and no later than 4 weeks prior to the start of the course.

We suggest that students should also set aside in the region of £500 to cover text books across the three years of the course. We will advise you which books will be the best to purchase as they will need to be useful to you even after graduation. Our college library contains many other books on the subjects we teach, for you to use whilst within our library.

When you start to work in the clinic in the third year you will need to purchase a starter kit containing the basic equipment you will need as a practitioner. We will give you a list of what is required. You may buy these items individually, or some suppliers offer a student discount or a group discount for you to order with your classmates. The starter kit will cost in the region of £150.

What is *Tui Na*?

***Tui Na* ('push-pull') is one of the branches of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) along with Acupuncture, Herbal medicine and *Qi gong*. It is a form of medical massage based around the acupuncture points and meridians. *Tui Na* practitioners need to have a thorough understanding of TCM principles in order to make an accurate diagnosis.**

Tui Na is becoming increasingly popular in the UK. All hospitals in China have a *Tui Na* department and the therapy is seen to be on the same level as acupuncture.

A *Tui Na* treatment typically happens whilst the person is still clothed. Skilled *Tui Na* practitioners utilise a wide range of techniques to knead, roll, press and rub the body which activates the flow of *Qi* and restores harmony. The technique dates back over 2,000 years and is used extensively in China to treat internal conditions as well as musculoskeletal issues.

There are different forms of *Tui Na* and you will be taught softer *Yin* styles and firmer *Yang* styles of treatment. You will also undertake *Qi gong* training to build your own personal energies.

Additional skills can be used in conjunction with *Tui Na* such as cupping and *Gua sha*, but unlike acupuncture the skin is not pierced. This means it can be used in any setting and is suitable for any age, from infants to the elderly.

When studying *Tui Na*, it is only through supervised clinical experience that you can really get to understand how to use the various techniques. Without supervised clinical experience it is impossible to gain a deeper understanding of how to treat complex conditions.

Two Year Licentiate in *Tui Na*

The City College of Acupuncture runs the most in-depth *Tui Na* course in the UK. Our Course Leader Julia Oji is a highly experienced *Tui Na* practitioner and teacher.

Practitioners of *Tui Na* need a deep understanding of the TCM diagnostic process in order to treat people successfully with *Tui Na*. This understanding of Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) needs to be as sophisticated as an Acupuncturist's.

When studying *Tui Na* as a TCM beginner you will need to choose our two-year course and come to college for two midweek days per week to complete all of the core modules in Year 1 and Year 2 of our acupuncture course, alongside our Acupuncture students.

In the second year, you will need to add on one extra day on Saturdays each week to take the *Tui Na* Techniques and *Tui Na* Clinical modules.

***Tui Na* Techniques (TNT)**

This unit will teach you the *Tui Na* manipulations and massage techniques, area routines, and practical skills such as cupping, *gua sha* and moxibustion. Orthopaedic tests and external herbal formulae are also taught.

This unit develops your physical strength, stamina, and sensitivity to internal *Qi* through the study and practice of *Shaolin Nei Gong*, as well as various other types of *Qi Gong* (focused breathing) including the Six Healing Sounds, which can be incorporated into therapeutic *Tui Na* practices.

***Tui Na* Clinic (TNC)**

This unit puts theory and practice together creatively to use a range of *Tui Na* techniques to look at complex disease patterns in Chinese medicine. It applies existing theoretical knowledge, reflective practice and practical skills acquired throughout the course in the context of supervised clinical practice with patients.

One Year Licentiate in *Tui Na*

This one-year *Tui Na* Course is suitable for fully qualified Acupuncturists and Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) Practitioners. If you are eligible to complete the One Year Licentiate in *Tui Na*, you will only need to attend CCA for one day per week on Saturdays to complete the two *Tui Na* Modules

When you start to work in the clinic you will need to purchase a starter kit containing the basic equipment you will need as a practitioner. We will give you a list of what you require. The starter kit will cost in the region of £150.

How to Find Us

By London Underground

Our college is around five minutes' walk from Old Street tube station (Northern Line). As at today's date, Old Street tube station is undergoing refurbishment, so currently you would take Exit 4 to leave the station, then walk forwards along City Road (you will see two very tall buildings, the Atlas building, and the M by Montcalm, which is a very angular triangle-shaped building, in front of you. After approximately 80 yards, at the traffic lights, take the right fork into East Road walking along the right-hand side of the Atlas building. Keep walking for another 200 yards and you will find The City College on your left. Usually, you would leave Old Street station at Exit 1 by taking the left-hand steps up to ground level. Proceed along City Road for a few hundred yards until the road forks in two. East Road is the fork on the right and the college is located a short way along on the left-hand side of the road. Keep walking for another 200 yards and you will find The City College.
N.B. Please check the prevailing information online regarding the Old Street tube station exits prior to starting your journey.
