Welcome to The City College of Acupuncture!

Studying Chinese Medicine is a life-changing and life-long experience.

It is exciting and challenging, but also enormously empowering. All of us come to Chinese Medicine and Acupuncture via our own unique route, and inspired by a variety of experienced teachers, we all develop into unique practitioners. We are united in our passion for the subject, and by a desire to assist and help people with compassion and understanding, be it students or patients.

We know that we can help you on your own journey to becoming a unique successful practitioner.

By discovering us, you have already made the first step on this journey. If you are still wondering whether studying acupuncture at The City College of Acupuncture is for you, we are here to answer your questions.

We run a professional Licentiate Diploma in Acupuncture course (*Lic.Ac*), which is a degree-level, in-depth, three-year full-time course (two full days per week in college, plus 10-15 hours of preparation home study per week) - as dictated by the British Acupuncture Accreditation Board (BAAB), with whom we have full accreditation.

BAAB courses are the gold standard of the profession, ensuring a solid basis of professional knowledge, attitudes, values and skills. You will receive practical, hands-on degree-level education.

We also teach a Diploma in Tui Na course (*Dip. Tui Na*). Our one-year course is open to fully qualified Acupuncturists and fully qualified TCM practitioners. For non-qualified applicants, our *Tui Na* course can be studied over a two-year period by taking Year 1 of our Acupuncture course, and then taking *Tui Na* in conjunction with taking Year 2 of our Acupuncture course.

Applicants sometimes worry that they are not academic enough to study on a degree-level course, or that age is a barrier. Please don't let this deter you, our students come to Acupuncture from all walks of life, some with no formal qualifications, some with PhDs, and everything in between, and our course is designed to give you all the support you need, whatever your background.

You will find our College is a very friendly environment, and you will receive all the guidance you require to achieve your qualification. Your life experiences, how you build upon them, and your ability to connect with people will be as crucial as your academic understanding.

Why study with us?

TEN great reasons to study Acupuncture and/or *Tui Na* at The City College of Acupuncture:

1) A broad and thorough grounding in Traditional Chinese Medicine

- We believe that students should remain open-minded, and we will teach you all the main methods of diagnosis, and how to use acupuncture, rather than limiting your training to a particular specialism too early
- If you were to specialise in one form of acupuncture too early, this would mean that you may actually need to go back to basics to fully understand what you didn't initially learn, in order to further your understanding of TCM

2) Hands-on, practical work in every module

- Our aim is to create excellent practitioners, which means we have a strong focus on the practical skills of acupuncture from the outset
- Once our students have proven competent in point location, you will start needling, cupping and using moxibustion within a few weeks of starting the course, and will continue to do so throughout the whole of the course

3) Small groups within each anatomy & point location class means apprentice-like training

- Learning anatomy and point location is a new concept if you don't yet have any experience in bodywork. Therefore we split our students into small groups within each of these particular classes, as it is essential to receive extensive one-to-one feedback
- Non-practical subjects such as Western Medical Sciences can also be as complex to understand as Chinese Medicine. These lectures are held as a whole class, and we provide support to all our students in these academic subjects

4) An eclectic approach to teaching

- Our teaching staff trained in a number of different institutions, and they therefore bring a wide range of experience to the CCA course
- We ensure that we teach you the most up-to-date, relevant and essential information for work as an acupuncturist

5) High academic standards

- Our Licentiate Diploma in Acupuncture course is taught at levels 4, 5, and 6, which means that it is at **the same level as a degree**

Anand Marshall BSc, LicAc, Dip Kanpo, MBAcC, MRCHM

- Anand Marshall is our Student Clinic Module Lead, and a lecturer on our CMP module.
- He worked in the first NHS Complementary Therapies Unit in Westminster
- He specialises in Japanese forms of acupuncture and herbalism
- Anand qualified as a Traditional Acupuncturist from the London School of Traditional Acupuncture and Chinese Medicine and as a Kanpo Herbalist (Japanese herbalist) from the Japanese Herbal Medicine apprenticeship course. He undertook post-graduate training in Japanese Acupuncture with Dr Stephen Birch. He attended postgraduate training with Dr Arnould Versluys focussing on the Shan Han Lun Herbal medicine.
- *'Before I qualified as a practitioner, I worked as a senior social worker in Children's Families teams and later in a Youth Offending team. As much as I valued this job, I realised it was not a career that I could envisage undertaking for the rest of my life. Due to the stressful nature of my job, I developed pains and sleep problems and out of desperation sought the help of an acupuncturist. Within a few sessions my energy increased, my pain reduced, and I was sleeping well. After a few more years of occasional treatments, I decided to embark on my new career and have never looked back. I worked from 2001 to 2014 in Westminster as part of an NHS complementary medicine service - the first of its kind in Britain - where I treated GP-referred patients suffering from insomnia, menstrual problems, peripheral joint pains and muscular skeletal conditions'.*

Alex Brazkiewicz BSc (Hons), Dip Tui Na, Cert Qigong, Cert.Ed., Cert Paramedic Science, MGOC

- Alex is a lecturer on our Tui Na course.
- an accomplished Traditional Chinese Medicine practitioner, Tui Na tutor, State Registered Paramedic and an Osteopath
- Alex was introduced to Shiatsu through his martial arts training over 30 years ago and has been practising bodywork and Japanese martial arts ever since. He gained his degree in Traditional Acupuncture at the College of Integrated Chinese Medicine in Reading, after which he volunteered at the NHS Gateway clinic in South London.
- Alex's passion for Tui Na resulted in him studying extensively in China, including undertaking regular month-long study trips to Beijing to study Channel Palpation and Applied Channel Theory under Professor Wang Ju Yi. After his last trip in 2013, he returned to

When you graduate, we want you to feel completely confident in treating a wide range of conditions - physical, emotional, and sometimes even spiritual. To achieve this, you need to observe and practice a wide range of treatment techniques.

Our BAAB-accredited Licentiate Diploma in Acupuncture course is composed of modules that focus on different specialist areas. We also have some strands of activity which thread across all the modules - practical strands - which mean that all of your lessons have a practical aspect to them.

Practical Skills Strand

All students need to be relaxed and confident when you go into our student clinic. Training for clinical skills, such as tongue and pulse diagnosis, needling, cupping, *gua sha*, moxibustion, electro acupuncture and auricular acupuncture, begins within a few weeks of you joining us, and these are practiced regularly throughout the duration of the course.

Every lesson you take will have time dedicated to the Practical Skills Strand, to provide you with as much practical experience as possible.

As part of this training, all students will take turns with your points-partner classmates to locate anatomical landmarks, and to practice finding acupuncture points on each other. Please note that this will sometimes involve removing or loosening some articles of clothing. You will also start practicing needling, cupping, moxibustion and the other ancillary skills on your classmates, and they in turn will practice on you - all within a highly supervised setting in the classroom.

Apprenticeship Days Strand

Another strand that threads across several modules is the Apprenticeship Day strand. On these days, members of the public kindly volunteer to be a patient, and they are treated for a wide range of conditions. You will have the opportunity to observe these treatments in close proximity in the classroom. Students will practice your tongue and pulse skills, and the tutor or practitioner that treats the patients will discuss the cases in depth.

In Year 1, these treatments are given by our CCA tutors, and in Year 2, we invite a wide range of other practitioners - some newly qualified, some hugely experienced - to give the treatments, for you to observe a wide scope and variety of approaches to treatment possibilities.

We pride ourselves on being a college that embraces eclecticism, and we ensure that you see a range of practitioners from different backgrounds, which helps you to start thinking about which approach resonates with you, and how you would like to practice once you are qualified.

Our Support Still Continues Once You Have Graduated

If you have missed any lectures, or need to refresh your knowledge on any subject, you are very welcome to come to college and re-attend any lecture on the course. Just let us know what you need to go over, and we will tell you when those classes are running.

Attendance and Time Commitments

Our acupuncture course class days are from 9.30 a.m. to 5.00 p.m.

You will attend college onsite for two days each week.

There is an additional 10-15 hours of preparation home study each week.

Therefore, our Acupuncture course, and our 2-Year Tui Na Course, are regarded as 'full-time'.

You will be expected to attend **a minimum of 80%** of your non-practical lectures.

Mandatory 100% attendance is required for your 400 Clinical Hours. These Clinical Hours are accrued by attending Apprenticeship Days in Year 1 and in Year 2, and by attending the Student Clinic and some external Apprenticeship/Observation Days in Year 3.

Studying with us will be a big commitment, but it will be worth it!

Final Year Student Clinic

Please note that in the final year we run two shifts on the student clinic days, and subject to class numbers, these student clinic days may be on Tuesdays and also on Thursdays. The two shifts per day mean that one group comes in earlier and leaves earlier, whilst another comes in later and leaves later. We will do our best to accommodate you in the clinic of your choice, on the day of your choice, subject to availability, but you will need to be flexible.

Additional time commitments

As this is a degree-level course, you will be expected to do a considerable amount of preparation home study - in the region of 10-15 hours every week.

This preparation home study could consist of familiarising yourself with the lesson content for the next weeks' lecture or practical class, recommended reading, memorising facts, writing essays, practising your anatomy or point location with classmates or friends, or perhaps journaling reflections on your experiences.

Each lesson will have tutor-directed home study to accompany it, but there will also be time for you to just 'follow your nose' and complete additional study that interests you.

APPLICANT INFORMATION SHEET

The City College of Acupuncture has designed our course to create fantastic practitioners.

You do not require any previous practitioner experience, medical qualifications, or specialist training - we will teach you everything required to become a professional Acupuncturist.

Our entry requirements are:

- **Appropriate life experience or 120 points at 'A' level**
- **Online English Test**

You may wish to study Acupuncture or Tui Na as a career change, and may not have any previous academic qualifications. This need not be viewed as a barrier to becoming a successful practitioner. Our in-depth interview techniques will be able to establish if you are eligible to enrol on our course.

At interview, we will be looking for your commitment to the subject, your ability to study in Higher Education, your life experiences and how you have built upon them, and your ability to interact with people. The areas that we will discuss with you during interview include:

Study - Studying any form of Chinese Medicine takes commitment

- Are you able to attend on-site classes at our college two days every week?
- Are you able to set aside 10-15 hrs per week for preparation home study?
- Do you have access to a computer, the Internet, and IT skills appropriate for degree-level study?
- Will you be able to attend a minimum of 80% of non-practical lectures, and attend 100% of the designated clinical hours?
- There are no exemptions from the Clinical Hours.

Practical work

Acupuncture is a practical skill, and all students acquiring these skills will need to participate in being models/patients, and working with other students

- Will you be able to **work with male and female practice partners, and male and female patients?**
- Will you be able to remove/loosen clothing (behind screens if required) down to your underwear in some classes, so that your classmates can locate acupoints and anatomy on you, and vice versa?
- Will you be able to practice skills on your classmates such as needling and cupping?

Practitioner development

You will be studying to become a therapist and to work with people in a respectful and appropriate manner

- Are you fluent in English?
- We teach in English, if English is not your first language, do you feel confident that you will understand the lectures?
- Is there anything that might prevent you from joining a professional register after completing your studies, such as a criminal record, alcohol and drug dependency issues, or mental health issues?
- Are you aware that studying to be a practitioner will involve self-reflection?
- You may be asked to examine who you are and what motivates you, and at times this may take you out of your normal comfort zone.

Please note that we are a selective college. We are sometimes unable to offer a place if we think it is not appropriate for someone.

RPL

If you have previously studied, and achieved, qualifications or modules of Chinese Medicine or Western Medicine, you may be eligible for Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL).

This would enable you to be exempt from attending certain parts of the programme.

Acupuncture Course Fee Notes

The **non-refundable £150** registration fee, and full payment course fees, or the first of the 2-part-payment instalments, are due following a successful interview, and no later than 6 weeks prior to the start of the course.

Students should also set aside in the region of £500 to cover text books across the three years of the course.

We will advise you which books will be the best to purchase, as they will need to be useful to you even after graduation.

Our college library contains a comprehensive selection of Acupuncture and Tui Na books, and many other books on the subjects we teach, for you to use whilst you are within our library.

When you start to work in the student clinic in the third year, you will need to purchase a starter kit containing the essential equipment you will need as a practitioner.

We will give you a list of the items required. You may decide to buy these items individually, or some suppliers offer a student discount or a group discount for you to order with your classmates.

The Clinic starter kit will cost in the region of £150.

How to Find Us

By London Underground

Our college is around five minutes' walk from Old Street tube station (Northern Line). As at today's date, Old Street tube station is undergoing refurbishment, so currently you would take Exit 4 to leave the station, then walk forwards along City Road (you will see two very tall buildings, the Atlas building, and the M by Montcalm, which is a very angular triangle-shaped building, in front of you. After approximately 80 yards, at the traffic lights, take the right fork into East Road walking along the right-hand side of the Atlas building. Keep walking for another 200 yards and you will find The City College on your left. Usually, you would leave Old Street station at Exit 1 by taking the left-hand steps up to ground level. Proceed along City Road for a few hundred yards until the road forks in two. East Road is the fork on the right and the college is located a short way along on the left-hand side of the road. Keep walking for another 200 yards and you will find The City College.
N.B. Please check the prevailing information online regarding the Old Street tube station exits prior to starting your journey.
